




Unemployment Rate is Rising, Still Low

Unemployed for 15 Weeks & Over is Rising in U.S. and Oregon. (U-1)


Employed part-time but want full-time is rising. (U-6 minus U-5).


JOBS IN WASHINGTON COUNTY DECLINING FROM 2023 PEAK






WASHINGTON COUNTY EMPLOYMENT AND WAGE LOSSES

Washington County, 2025Q1: **302,600** Employment **\$1,723** Average Weekly Wage












INITIAL CLAIMS FOR UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE BENEFITS



12-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted






FED FUNDS RATE: THE DUAL MANDATE




Despite inflation hovering slightly above target, The Fed lowered its rate by 0.25 in September.












LONG-TERM EMPLOYMENT OUTLOOK





POPULATION INCREASING


Components of Population Change 2020-2024

Graph of the Month: Nonemployers. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's Nonemployer Statistics (NES), Washington County had more than 45,000 nonemployer establishments in 2023, a gain of about 1,900 (+4.3%) from 2022.

Washington County's nonemployer establishments generated about \$2.52 billion in revenue in 2023, up from \$2.46 billion in 2022 (+2.7%).

Despite having the third most establishments, "real estate, rental, and leasing" was the single largest contributor to nonemployer revenue in the county, accounting for more than \$604 million.

Unemployment is at its highest since August 2015 excluding the pandemic—up to 4.5% from 3.7% last year January 2000 to July 2025, seasonally adjusted











Employment in Washington County reached 305,000 in July 2025, a -5,700 decrease from July 2024.
